NOT HOW I IMAGINED IT!!

You may remember a couple of issues back in our newsletters the story about the eight, three day old puppies. In the last newsletter they were all adopted, all was well and everyone was happy! Another happy endings tail!!!?? Not so happy tail for one of the puppies when she was diagnosed with congenital kidney failure. This is Nelly's owners story in her own words.

When I first found out about Nelly's health problems, the worst part was waiting for answers. I couldn't help but fear the worst. I googled all the information I could find on real dysplasia. It wasn't good. I was hoping that her kidney values were elevated due to the UTI. When the ultrasound confirmed the diagnosis, I really didn't want to believe it. I just kept thinking that she couldn't be sick because she doesn't act sick. The specialist explained that since she was born with this condition, it feels normal to her because her kidney values have always been high. I felt heartbroken when the vet told me that she would eventually stop eating, drinking, and playing. It seemed so surreal because she's still so little. Her baby tooth fell out at the vet appointment! When the vet recommended meds and diet changes, I was totally on board. I wanted to do whatever I could so she would feel better. When we got home from spending all day at the specialist's office in Phoenix, it really set in. I felt overwhelmed and scared about the new diet, meds, and the possibility of fluids. Then I sat down with the paperwork, meds, and supplies. I got organized! A few simple changes were very manageable. I swapped out her meaty treats for raspberries. Her medicine goes in the raspberries or directly on her food. She doesn't need fluids yet so I decided not to worry about that right now but I have a box of supplies in the closet for when that day comes. I also ordered her prescription puppy food in a large bag from an internet supplier. The specialist just called yesterday and the good news is that her labs look pretty much the same. She hasn't improved but she's not getting any sicker. Hopefully, these changes will allow us to keep her kidney values stable for as long as possible. The vet told me the difficult part would be looking at her every day and knowing that she is sick and that nothing can fix her. It's true. Nothing will cure her renal dyspla-

sia...but Nelly doesn't seem bothered. Now that I've had some time to adjust to the news, it bothers me less and less. My puppy is happy, loving, and having a grand time chewing on anything she can find. What else could I ask for her? I think when she gets really sick, it will be hard for me. But for now, everything is really okay.

I guess this is another happy ending tail!

She was barking when she was in the car and would see people outside. What we did was when she would bark I would say, "no bark"! if she stopped then I would give her a treat and say "good no bark." It seems to be working and she is getting better. She seemed to do it most at the post office when I went for the mail so I spend a little more time when I go and do a little training while I am there. People watching think I am crazy... "No bark... Good no bark!" give treat. I started taking her to the doggie park as often as possible to meet other dogs and to see other people besides



me. I am not crazy about dog parks and still take care to protect her from other dogs that the owner is not watching well. Remember that if you have any problems with you puppies to ask a trainer in your area and try to fix the problem right away. Always chose a trainer that used positive methods and is never harsh. Maggie is still getting up around 4 am to ask to go outside potty, but is very consistent during the day to let herself out the doggie door. All in good time.



WYATT, NOW WHAT?



Two months ago we were dealing with colic. A little time goes by and all of a sudden Wyatt is limping. His legs did not seem swollen so we just gave him some bute powder for those old legs. As the days pass it seems to get worse and he can hardly walk. We get the vet in to check it out and after about 5 minutes he finds out that it is an abscess on the bottom of his hoof. He makes a nice little hole in the bottom of his hoof and out comes a very nasty looking liquid. He

bandages it and of course it falls off in 2 days. Keeping it clean was hard to do so I got out the big plastic boot. Put it on his foot and then filled it with salt water so it could soak all day and continue draining. It seemed to work good and he stopped limping within two days.

Morning Starr is helping with a large cat rescue in lake Montezuma area! When we got an email and were asked what we could do to help with a large cat rescue we told them we were willing to help with the cost of the spay/neuter of these cats and kittens in order to get them into new homes.
