MAGGIES CORNER

For all of you with new puppies here are some helpful hints that I have learned while raising Maggie. Her biting and chewing on humans has almost stopped com-



pletely. When she chews or bites something that is not for dogs, like my books or my hand!! I touch her with a claw hand and then offer her a bully stick or toy to distract her. At the same time I touch her I use a short TSSS sound. Her attention span is short and she just starts to chew the stick or play with the toy forgetting the object be it human or otherwise. Maggie has started puppy classes to help with her socialization. Our homework is to take her to as many places as possible to let her experience different people, i.e. children, men, women and also different feelings under her feet, like grass, dirt, cement and stones. She is very used to our other dogs but it is important to go to the class so she



can meet other puppies too. Never punish your puppy but you can discipline them with a calm assertive posture. Use less sounds, such as yelling and more touch and showing them what you want. Never hit your dog. They don't understand this at all. Maggie is around 4 months old now and is spayed and has all her shots. My place looks like a daycare center with all the toys which I pick up at garage sales for her. Stay tuned for more of Maggie's progress.

COLIC IN HORSES



Wyatt, one of our very senior horses, 30+ yrs. was showing signs of colic one morning. He has been at the Sanctuary for 9 years and never had colic. He did not want to eat and was bit-

ing at his stomach. He would lie down not want to get up. He was very listless and looked a little dehydrated. I did not let him out to pasture that morning. He spent most of the morning standing over his water bowl but did not drink. I tried to offer him his favorite treats, but no go.

I drove to the vets office and described his symptoms and asked what to do. The vet said to take away all the food so his stomach could settle. He gave me a tube of electrolytes and a tube of banamine. If he did not come around soon the vet would come out but told me to try these things first. I gave him the electrolytes. I cleaned out his trough from any food that was left. Then I gave him the banamine. It took about an hour but he started to drink. I did not give him any food right away but instead put him out to pasture with his buddies. I fed him his feed in the evening and he seemed to be eating and drinking normally. PHEW! Colic is never fun to deal with but it can be managed.

GRANT WRITERS

We could really use someone who knows how to write some grants. We are wanting to get some grants for Spay Neuter Programs in order to give more help to the community. If we can raise funds for the Spay Neuter Program then that would give us more funds to spend on our Feed Assistance Program and we could start a Vet Bill Assistance Program too.
